"L'esprit de l'Australie" translates into English as "The Spirit of Australia" and this is how Australians see the the Art Prizes awarded last week at the Art Gallery of New South Wales (AGNSW).

The best known is the Archibald Prize (portraiture of personalities from the country). This prize is endowed with a scholarship of \$100,000.

The Wynne Prize, awarded with a cash prize of \$50,000, is awarded to the best painting of an Australian landscape or figurative sculpture, while the Sulman Prize (\$40,000) is awarded to the best subject painting project, genre painting or wall painting, of course always on an Australian theme.

This year, there were 57 finalists in this category and artist Julia Gutman won the 2023 Archibald Prize and \$100,000 for her portrait of singer-songwriter Montaigne.

Aged 29, Gutman is one of the youngest winners in the award's 102-year history. It is also the 13th time that the Archibald Prize has been awarded to a woman since its creation in 1921. (see photo)

The 2023 Wynne Prize (41 finalists) was won by artist Zaachariaha Fielding for her painting Inma, which depicts the sounds of Mimili, a small Aboriginal community in the eastern part of the Anangu Pitjantjarjara Yankunytjatjara (APY) lands, South Australia.

Fielding was thrilled and said "I feel like dancing right now. Work is music, and I am music. My work is a celebration and also a song in itself and the sound comes from my community." (see photos)

Aboriginal artist Doris Bush Nungarrayi won the 2023 Sulman Prize (44 finalists) for her painting Mamunya ngalyananyi (Monsters to Come), depicting several Mamus, the sinister and malevolent spirits that terrify Anangu.

Nungarrayi is the second Indigenous artist to win the Sulman Prize.

Mamus or "the cheeky ones", as Nungarrayi calls them, are generally considered to have large haunting eyes, straight standing hair, and can transform into many different forms, including the human figure. Mamus usually hide in underground dwellings or inside hollow trees. (view the photo).
